Leader: Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to



GOD CLEANSES US IN HIS SON

God declares our sin, our rejection of him, and calls us to repent

Revelation 2

But I have this against you, that you have abandoned the love you had at first. Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent, and do the works you did at first. If not, I will come to you and remove your lampstand from its place, unless you repent.

So often Christians act as if they no longer sin. The reality Scripture teaches is that those in Christ are free from slavery to sin. We no longer face death as the price of our sin because Jesus Christ took our sin on himself. And yet we continue to sin. So we cry out to God through Jesus Christ to be at work in us. We confess our failings and ask that we would live in the strength of Christ's death and resurrection.

We repent, turning back from our sin to God

Leader: Lord, you said, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments."

People: Forgive us our lukewarm love and our disobedience.

Leader: Lord, you said, "You may ask for anything in my name."

People: Forgive us when we think we need to solve our own problems.

Leader: Lord, you said, "Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." People: We confess that our lives are often consumed by worry and anxiety.

Leader: Lord, you said, "If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit."

People: Forgive us our barren lives, Lord.

Leader: Lord, you said, "You must testify, for you have been with me."

People: We confess, Lord, that we have too often been silent.

Leader: Lord, you said, "Love each other as I have loved you."

People: Forgive us that our lukewarm love for you finds its expression in our lack of

love for each other.

Leader: Lord, you said that the wages of sin is death, but your gift, O God, is eternal

life in Christ Jesus.

People: Father, thank you for the great depth of your love for us that would lead

you to give your Son for our sin. May our lives boast, not in ourselves, our gifts, our powers, our wisdom, but only in Jesus Christ, his death and

resurrection. Thank you that by your love his wounds have paid our ransom.



Delusions, Meet Grace

We respond to his call rejoicing in his love that is never lukewarm



I have loved you with an everlasting love; therefore I have continued my faithfulness to you. Jeremiah 31 God offers us his grace giving us himself in Jesus Christ. Our response is to acknowledge this by offering ourselves to him. The money we give is but an expression of a larger reality: our giving our whole selves to him.

We respond to God's words of honesty and hope, giving ourselves to him as we give our tithes and offerings

We give our offerings to God as a public demonstration of our faith, putting our money where our mouths are. In this action we show what we claim, that our lives are organized around God and lived for him instead of ourselves.

We answer his invitation by coming to him in prayer

During this time we live in faith, trusting in the power of his grace, placing our lives and our church in his hands.

We ask that he would work in us and through us for his glory.

Our lukewarm love and lives are transformed as we hear God's words of hope and taste the feast that is ours in Christ in the celebration of the Lord's Supper

We celebrate God's free grace to us in Jesus Christ by observing the Lord's Supper each Sunday. We invite to the Lord's Table all those who are baptized followers of Jesus Christ, under the authority of Christ and his body, the Church. By eating the bread and drinking the cup with us as a visitor, you are acknowledging to our church that you are in covenant with God. You also acknowledge that you are a sinner, without hope except in the sovereign mercy of God, and that you are trusting in Jesus Christ alone for your salvation. If you have any doubts about your participation, please speak to one of the elders after the service. Wine and bread are the elements of the supper as instituted by Jesus Christ and so we follow his example.


