


Our worship is a reflexive and a deliberate response to God's gracious call to come to him.

GOD SANCTIFIES US BY HIS GRACE

We confess our sin, our turning from God to our own way, and rest in the good Shepherd who was pierced for our transgressions

We use this time in God's presence to confess our sins and our need for God's grace, silently, personally before him alone. We invite you to join us in sorrow over your sin and joy in his grace and mercy in Jesus Christ.

God calls his straying sheep to look to the good Shepherd who bore our sins

I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep... He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. 
