GOD SANCTIFIES US BY HIS GRACE

God confronts us with our sin

"If you love me, you will keep my commandments."

If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

We confess our sin

Leader: Lord, you said, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments."

People: We confess that we have failed to keep your commands. Forgive us our

lukewarm love and our disobedience.

Leader: Lord, you said, "You may ask for anything in my name."

People: Forgive us when we think we need to solve our own problems.

Leader: Lord, you said, "Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." People: We confess that our lives are often consumed by worry and anxiety.

Leader: Lord, you said, "If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit."

People: Forgive us our barren lives, Lord.

Leader: Lord, you said, "You must testify, for you have been with me."

People: We confess, Lord, that we have too often been silent. Leader: Lord, you said, "Love each other as I have loved you."

People: Forgive us for our lack of love for any other than ourselves, for thinking that we deserve your love while seeing so clearly how much others do not deserve it because of their sin. We confess that we love out of our sin

instead of your grace.

In these and in so many other ways, we confess our failures and shortcomings, acknowledging our need for your grace that we do not deserve, and resting in your promise to cleanse us from all our righteousness. We rest in your love displayed in our Redeemer, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Confession of sin happens within the context of relationship, both with God and each other. We confess together, in community, before a gracious God who has given us himself. Confession both acknowledges our need for grace and celebrates its abundance in Christ.

God declares our redemption, his buying us back by paying the wages of our sin



GOD STRENGTHENS US BY HIS GRACE

We celebrate the Lord's Supper proclaiming that, united to Christ in his death and resurrection, we are united to one another

We invite to the Lord's Table all those who are baptized followers of Jesus Christ, under the authority of Christ and his body, the Church. By eating the bread and drinking the cup, you proclaim that you are in covenant relationship with God, that you are a sinner, without hope except in the sovereign mercy of God, and that you are trusting in Jesus Christ alone for your salvation. If you have any doubts about your participation, please speak to one of the elders after the service. Wine and bread are the elements of the supper as instituted by Jesus Christ and so we follow his example.

Communion is, of all the actions of worship, a uniquely corporate event. We can sing alone, or study Scripture alone, or pray alone, but nobody does Communion alone for it is our celebration that we are united to Jesus Christ, and in him, to each other.

We give our tithes and offerings to live out our mutuality as we offer our lives to God together as his Church

We believe and profess, one catholic or universal Church, which is a holy congregation, of true Christian believers, all expecting their salvation in Jesus Christ, being washed by his blood, sanctified and sealed by the Holy Ghost... Furthermore, this holy Church is not confined, bound, or limited to a certain place or to certain persons, but is spread and dispersed over the whole world; and yet is joined and united with heart and will, by the power of faith, in one and the same spirit.

All saints, that are united to Jesus Christ their Head, by his Spirit, and by faith, have fellowship with him in his graces, sufferings, death, resurrection, and glory: and, being united to one another in love, they have communion in each other's gifts and graces, and are obliged to the performance of such duties, public and private, as do conduce to their mutual good, both in the inward and outward man.

Cover artwork: La Sonata (Sonata), Marcel Duchamp, oil on canvas, 1911.

In Sonata, a painting begun at the family home in Rouen, France, Marcel Duchamp shows his sisters performing a musical recital. Yvonne plays the piano, Magdeleine is on the violin, and Suzanne sits in the foreground, while their mother attentively listens from behind. The intertwined, symmetrical composition and atmospheric color tonalities of the painting bring the sisters' two-part harmony to life in visual terms. This work marks the artist's first attempts at Cubism—a style he initially championed and emulated along with his brothers, Jacques Villon and Raymond Duchamp-Villon, and a group of likeminded artists working in and around Paris during the 1910s.
