

GOD STRENGTHENS US BY HIS GRACE

We celebrate the Lord's Supper, resting in the protection of Christ our rock

We celebrate God's free grace to us in Jesus Christ by observing the Lord's Supper each Sunday. We invite to the Lord's Table all who are baptized followers of Jesus Christ under the authority of Christ and his body, the Church. By eating the bread and drinking the cup, you are acknowledging that you are a sinner, without hope except in the sovereign mercy of God, and that you are trusting in Jesus Christ alone for your salvation. If you have any doubts about your participation, please speak to one of the elders after the service.

Romans 5:12-19

Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because all sinned—for sin indeed was in the world before the law was given, but sin is not counted where there is no law. Yet death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sinning was not like the transgression of Adam, who was a type of the one who was to come.

But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if many died through one man's trespass, much more have the grace of God and the free gift by the grace of that one man Jesus Christ abounded for many. And the free gift is not like the result of that one man's sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brought justification. For if, because of one man's trespass, death reigned through that one man, much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness reign in life through the one man Jesus Christ.

Therefore, as one trespass led to condemnation for all men, so one act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all men.

For as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.

Westminster Larger Catechism Q#22	Did all mankind fall in that first transgression? The covenant being made with Adam as a public person, not for himself only, but for his posterity, all mankind descending from him by ordinary generation, sinned in him, and fell with him in that first transgression.
Westminster Shorter Catechism Q#20	Did God leave all mankind to perish in the estate of sin and misery? God having, out of his mere good pleasure, from all eternity, elected some to everlasting life, <i>did enter into a covenant of grace</i> , to deliver them out of the estate of sin and misery, and to bring them into an estate of salvation by a Redeemer.
Westminster Larger Catechism Q#31	With whom was the covenant of grace made? The covenant of grace was made with Christ as the second Adam, and in him with all the elect as his seed.

A catechism is a teaching tool written in question-andanswer format. The Westminster Larger & Shorter Catechisms were written in England in the 1640s to teach about God as he reveals himself in the Bible. It has been used by congregations and families in both worship and instruction for almost 400 years.



Our Daily Worship A through-the-week devotional



The following pages are provided for you with a desire to "lead you beside still waters". May they assist you in your walk with Christ through week, as you practice his presence, feed upon his word, and reflect upon how both impact your weekly life.

Monday

Scripture: Luke 3:23 – Jesus, when he began his ministry, was about thirty years of age, being the son (as was supposed) of Joseph...

Reflection: The Gospel begins with a name. Nothing miraculous—just a list of fathers and sons. But in that quiet beginning, God is keeping ancient promises. Jesus didn't appear out of nowhere; He came as the answer to every covenant promise, the fulfillment of every thread in redemptive history. Not through mythology, but through human lineage.

Our Common Weakness: We often skip over genealogies in Scripture, dismissing them as irrelevant or dull—missing the profound way God works through ordinary names and long-forgotten generations.

Christ Connection: Christ steps onto the scene as the long-promised Son. In Him, the silence breaks, and God's Word stands visible.

Luke 3:23 What does the quiet beginning of Jesus' ministry—through a genealogy—teach us about God's ways of working?

Genesis 12:1–3 How do God's promises to Abraham help you read the genealogy of Jesus with fresh eyes?

Micah 5:2 How does this quiet prophecy—about a small town and a long-promised King help you trust that God is still at work, even when His ways seem hidden or slow in your life?

Prayer: Lord, Your faithfulness spans generations. Teach me to rest in Your Word, even when the fulfillment seems slow. Thank You for Christ, who proves You always keep Your promises. Amen.

Tuesday

Scripture: Luke 3:23b–31 – ...the son of David, the son of Jesse, the son of Obed... the son of Boaz... the son of Judah... the son of Jacob... the son of Isaac... the son of Abraham...

Reflection: These names are not filler. They are covenant echoes—living proof that God never forgets His Word. Jesus arrives not by chance, but by divine commitment. Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Judah, Boaz, David... Each name recalls a promise: a serpent-crushing Seed, a blessing for all nations, a forever King. The Gospel doesn't bypass history—it fulfills it.

Our Common Weakness: We want spiritual results now, without the wait, and so rather rewrite the story than trust the Author.

Christ Connection: Christ came just as promised. The ancient covenant line held, not because people were faithful—but because God was.

Luke 1:54–55 What does Mary's song teach us about God's faithfulness to His covenant with Abraham and his offspring?

2 Corinthians 1:20 How does this passage help you see that the Old Testament covenants were always pointing to Him—and that, by faith, you are now grafted into all those promises?

Psalm 105:8–10 Why is it vital to remember God's covenant over generations? How might your faithfulness today bless future believers?

Prayer: God of Abraham and David, You keep covenant through centuries and sinners. Anchor my trust in Your promises—even the ones that feel far off. Teach me to wait with hope, knowing Christ has already come—and will come again. Amen.

Wednesday

Scripture: Luke 3:31–34 – ...the son of Melea, the son of Menna, the son of Mattatha... the son of Esli... the son of Naggai...

Reflection: These are the names we forget—if we ever knew them at all. No stories, no miracles—just quiet links in the chain. But the Spirit included them for a reason. God's redemption doesn't depend on fame or flash. It moves through generations of quiet faithfulness.

Our Common Weakness: We equate significance with spotlight. If our obedience isn't seen or celebrated, we wonder if it matters at all.

Christ Connection: Jesus came through men and women never mentioned elsewhere in Scripture; yet they still carried the line of the Messiah. So your quiet faithfulness—your prayers, your service, your parenting, your one-on-one discipleship, your patience—is not wasted. Christ redeems the ordinary. In Him, no act of obedience is ever overlooked.

Hebrews 6:10 How does this verse reassure you when your service feels unseen or small?

1 Corinthians 1:27–29 Why does God often work through the weak or hidden things of the world? How does this encourage you today?

Galatians 6:9 How does this verse encourage you to persevere in quiet faithfulness—even when there's no immediate fruit?

Prayer: Lord of every generation, You see what we overlook. Teach me to trust that Your hand is at work—even when mine seems empty. May I find joy in quiet faithfulness, knowing Christ came through the seeming mundaneness of life. Amen.

Thursday

Scripture: Luke 3:38 – ...the son of Enos, the son of Seth, the son of Adam, the son of God. Reflection: Luke's genealogy goes all the way to Adam, not just Abraham. He wants us to see Jesus not just as Israel's Messiah, but the Savior of all ethnicities. Adam failed to represent humanity in righteousness. But Christ came as the new and better Adam, the true Son of God, who would obey where Adam disobeyed, bringing life where Adam brought death.

Our Common Weakness: We still act like Adam is in charge—as if we're the authority over our lives, not Christ.

Christ Connection: Jesus came as the new Adam—our covenant head and our hope. In Him, a new humanity is born. When we belong to Christ, we're no longer defined by the fall of Adam but by the righteousness of our Savior.

Luke 3:36-38 How does tracing Jesus' line through both judgment (Noah) and creation (Adam) deepen your confidence in Him as the Redeemer of all nations?

Romans 5:18–19 How does Paul describe the contrast between Adam and Christ? How does this deepen your understanding of what Jesus accomplished?

1 Corinthians 15:21–22 How does this passage clarify what it means for Christ to be the "new Adam"? What comfort does it give for daily life and final hope?

Prayer: Father, thank You for giving us a new head in Christ. Where Adam failed, Jesus triumphed. Let His obedience shape my heart, and His resurrection life empower my days. Teach me to walk in joyful submission—not as one bound by fear, but as one freed by grace. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Friday

Scripture: Isaiah 32:1–2 – Behold, a king will reign in righteousness, and princes will rule in justice. Each will be like a hiding place from the wind, a shelter from the storm, like streams of water in a dry place, like the shade of a great rock in a weary land.

Reflection: Isaiah foresaw rulers who would bring shelter to those under their care. What he saw in part, we see in fullness: Jesus is not only the promised King—He is the Rock Himself. Luke has taken us through a river of names. But where does it lead? To a Person. A place of rest. Jesus does not merely stand at the end of Israel's line—He becomes the source of a new one. He stepped into the torrent of judgment to bear its full weight. And now, behind Him— in the quiet waters of grace—we find rest. He is our shelter, our Rock, and from Him flows the water of life.

Our Common Weakness: We think we can withstand the torrent of sin instead of seeking the shelter of the Rock.

Christ Connection: Christ is the true King, the refuge for the weary, and the fountain of living water.

John 7:37–38 What does Jesus mean when He says rivers of living water will flow from within those who believe in Him? How does this tie back to being sheltered in Him? Consider also **Exodus 17:6** as you reflect.

Revelation 22:1–2 How does the image of the river of life flowing from the throne of God and the Lamb help you see that the story which began in Genesis and flowed through Luke 3 is now fulfilled in Christ—and still flowing toward you?

Prayer: Rock of our salvation, You stood in the storm so I could rest in grace. Thank You for taking the flood of judgment and becoming my hiding place. Let living water flow from You through me. Keep me in Your shelter—and send me in Your name. Amen.

CATECHISM CORNER

WLC .31 – With whom was the covenant of grace made? The covenant of grace was made with Christ as the second Adam, and in him with all the elect as his seed.

The covenant of grace rests on this astonishing truth: God made His saving promises not just to individuals here and there, but to Christ Himself—as the true representative of all who would be united to Him by faith. Jesus is the second Adam, the Head of a new humanity, securing redemption for those who belong to Him.

Scripture affirms this in multiple places:

- **Galatians 3:16–17** teaches that the promises made to Abraham were ultimately made to Christ, showing He is the focal point of God's covenantal plan.
- **Romans 5:15–21** shows Christ as the second Adam, whose obedience brings life and justification where Adam's disobedience brought death.
- **Isaiah 53:10–11** speaks of the suffering servant bearing guilt and, as a result, seeing His "offspring"—the people secured by His sacrifice.
- **Psalm 22:30** anticipates generations yet unborn who will be joined to Christ in worship and service.
- **Ephesians 1:4** assures us that God chose His people *in Christ* before the foundation of the world, anchoring the covenant in eternity.

Why does this matter? Because your hope doesn't rest in your performance, but in your union with Christ. If God made the covenant with Him, and you are in Him, then the promises are yours. Full stop.

If Jesus is the covenant Head, how does that shape your view of assurance and salvation?

Isaiah 53:10 speaks of Christ "seeing His offspring" and being satisfied. How does it encourage you to know that your faith is part of what brings joy to the heart of your Redeemer?

PRAYER/PRAISES

Your elders are praying over the following matters and invite you to join us in seeking the Lord's help:

- 1) Pray that the Lord would raise up deacons from within our congregation. In this season, many practical needs are being met by your elders, which can stretch the time we have for our primary calling—prayer and the ministry of the Word. We are trusting the Lord to provide co-laborers who can share in the care and service of Christ's body."
- 2) Pray for the completion and fruitful use of a new gospel booklet. Pastor Adam has written a short booklet designed to help communicate the gospel clearly and personally. - **3)** Pray for Per and Adam as they go to General Assembly this week. Pray that God will be glorified as the church gathers to do the business set before it.
