



FINANCIAL REPORT UPDATE

Our fiscal year runs from July through June, so the books have just closed on 2024–25. As you'll see in the report, we finished in the black—reason to praise our God, who faithfully provides for every need.

If you've tracked our quarterly or annual reports in the past, you'll notice a significant change in layout. This is the first report to include *Jordan's Bridge (JB)* in the financials. Why the change? When Free Grace was planted, it was with a clear vision: to be both a church and a counseling center, working together as one ministry. JB is not a separate entity—it is a vital arm of Free Grace. While most ministries (such as men's, women's, or children's ministry) are reflected solely in the expense column, JB is unique in that it largely "pays for itself." Yet because it is not a stand-alone organization, the Session has determined our financial reporting should reflect the reality: we are one church, one mission, one budget. To help you understand the report, a brief explanation is provided below:

Member Giving – Tithes and offerings from Free Grace members.

Visitor Giving – Giving from regular attenders who are not yet members of the church.

Partner Giving – This is a major portion of our income and important to understand. It represents the ongoing support of generous partners who pledged to help launch Free Grace and Jordan's Bridge 17 years ago. These gifts have sustained us for many years—but this line is slowly declining, as expected. It's a blessing that so many supporters have remained with us, but this number will continue to decline and must be considered when assessing our long-term financial health.

JB Fee Income – Insurance or out-of-pocket, client fees.

Overhead– Includes building rent, heat, insurance, utilities, equipment, software, and related administrative expenses.

Ministry – Expenses tied directly to the church's ministry functions—vision, outreach, fellowship, community, etc.

Personnel – Includes salaries for pastoral and counseling staff, as well as two part-time administrative roles.

Summary: We have much to give thanks for. Much good has been done through your giving. The Lord has used your generosity to meet real needs—and the fruit is visible. At the same time, the year ahead holds <u>more ministry</u>

opportunity than ever before: more counseling needs, more gospel conversations, more lives to shepherd. As "Partner Giving" continues its expected decline, the ongoing generosity of our own congregation becomes even more vital. The Session asks you to pray. As we step forward in faith, consider how the Lord may be calling you to give—not just to sustain the work, but to expand it.



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Our Daily Worship A through-the-week devotional



The following pages are provided for you with a desire to "lead you beside still waters". May they assist you in your walk with Christ through week, as you practice his presence, feed upon his word, and reflect upon how both impact your weekly life.

Monday

Scripture: Luke 4:31–44

Reflection: Others needed permission to act. Jesus needed none. His authority didn't require approval—it was inherent and immediate. He taught with power that needed no validation. Demons fled by His word. Fevers vanished at His command. Crowds pressed in not to debate, but to be delivered. Luke records these moments not merely to show that Jesus *did* great things, but to prove who Jesus *is*—the One with authority over all things. In this single scene, we glimpse the wide scope of His dominion: over the spiritual realm (demons), the physical body (sickness), and the mind and heart (doctrine). He does not

borrow power from another source. He speaks and it is done. The One who declared liberty in Nazareth now proves it in Capernaum. This is not myth or metaphor. This is God's King, exercising God's authority, in real time.

Our Common Weakness: We reduce Christ's authority to the areas we're comfortable surrendering—ignoring that He rules over all.

Christ Connection: Though we resist His reign in areas we want to control, Jesus graciously reclaims what is His—including us. His authority is not only total—it is good. **Colossians 1:15–18** Hebrews 1:1–3 Matthew 28:18–20

What do these passages together reveal about the scope of Christ's authority?

What do they show about the *source* of His authority?

How do they clarify the *purpose* for which Jesus exercises His authority?

Prayer: Lord Jesus, you have shown yourself to be King over all. Forgive me for the ways I divide my trust and compartmentalize your rule. Let me see your authority as good, holy, and redemptive—and help me live fully under it. Amen.

TUESDAY

Scripture: Luke 4:33–37

Reflection: In the synagogue at Capernaum, Jesus' presence exposed a hidden evil. A man with an unclean demon cried out in fear. The demon recognized Jesus' authority and begged to be left alone. But Jesus rebuked it, and with no struggle, the spirit came out. The crowd was astonished. He didn't cast out demons by ritual or borrowed power—He simply spoke. This is not brute force—it is rightful dominion. Jesus does not negotiate with darkness; He commands it. The spirit realm knows who He is and what He has come to do. And even now, while spiritual warfare remains real, Jesus has already declared victory. His word is still our shield and sword.

Our Common Weakness: We do not take spiritual warfare seriously, denying its reality, relying on our own strength rather than Christ's authority.

Christ Connection: Jesus, the conquering King, has crushed the powers of darkness and now supplies His Word and Spirit so His people can stand firm.

Matthew 12:28 – What does Jesus say demon-casting proves about the arrival of God's kingdom? How should that reshape how we view our lives under His reign?

Colossians 2:15 – How does Paul describe Christ's triumph over spiritual powers—and what does that mean for those who belong to Him?

James 4:7 – What two actions does James call us to? How do we resist the devil and submit to God by relying on the authority of Jesus and his word?

Prayer: Lord Jesus, you reign over every unseen power. Thank you that I do not face the enemy alone. Teach me to rely on your word, to take spiritual battle seriously, and to trust that you have already won the victory. Amen.

Wednesday

Scripture: Luke 4:38–40

Reflection: After displaying His authority over spirits, Jesus now shows His authority over sickness. He rebukes a fever and it leaves. He touches the sick and they are healed. Crowds press in, desperate for relief—and He gives it. But notice that he doesn't always do this... even in the text, he eventually leaves before everyone is healed.

This is where the so-called "health and wealth" gospel leads many astray. It claims healing is always God's will, and that true faith guarantees immediate relief. But Jesus' actions here and His silence in other places—prove otherwise. He has authority to heal, yet He sometimes delays. Sometimes He says no. And when He does, it is never from weakness or disinterest, but from his most holy and wise purposes.

He allows physical and spiritual trials to continue—because He is refining, humbling, shaping, and calling us to deeper trust. We may not understand His timing, but unlike in Job's day, we are not left in the dark. His Word shows that delay is not defeat—and suffering is not failure, but formation in His hands.

O.C.W: We struggle to trust Christ's authority when His timing doesn't align with our desires. **Christ Connection:** The King who sometimes withholds healing is the same King who bore our wounds and stays with us in the furnace.

2 Corinthians 12:7–10 What was God's purpose in allowing Paul's suffering, and how did that purpose reshape the way Paul viewed his weakness?

Isaiah 48:10 What does it mean that God refines us "in the furnace of affliction"? How should this shape our expectations in seasons of suffering?

Job 23:10 How does Job's trust in God's refining purpose—despite not understanding it challenge our response to suffering?

Prayer: Lord, your power is real—even when you do not act the way I wish. Help me trust your timing, your wisdom, and your goodness. Teach me to see suffering not as a sign of your absence, but as a place where your purposes are at work. Refine me in the waiting. Amen.

Scripture: Luke 4:42–44

Reflection: After healing many, the people urge him to stay. But he says he must go, because his mission is greater: to preach the good news of the kingdom. That remains the church's calling today—faithful proclamation of the truth above all other works.

Christ's authority extends even over doctrine. His word determines what is true. By his Spirit and Word, he still governs his people, through the church, whose authority is wholly spiritual and declarative. It is grounded in Christ's truth, not human opinion.

This means the church may not invent new doctrines, enforce personal preferences, or bind the conscience where Christ has not spoken. Nor are we free to ignore his commands or treat doctrine as negotiable.

Our Common Weakness: We confuse the church's mission—treating social programs as central, rather than proclaiming Christ as the heart of all we do—even in those very things. **Christ Connection:** Jesus rules His church by His Word and Spirit, uniting truth and mercy; His authority keeps the mission clear and Christ central.

Romans 10:17 – Why must the Word—not signs or programs—remain central to the church's mission, and how does this verse clarify what leads to saving faith?

Matthew 12:39 – What warning does Jesus give about seeking signs instead of listening to His Word, and how does that speak to modern desires for the spectacular?

Luke 10:16 – How seriously does Jesus treat the hearing of His Word—and what does it mean that to reject the church's faithful proclamation is to reject Him?

Prayer: Lord Jesus, your Word gives life. Guard me from chasing signs or distractions, and give me ears to hear and hearts to receive your truth. Keep your church faithful—proclaiming you in all things with clarity, courage, and compassion. Amen.

FRIDAY

Scripture: Luke 4:42–44 (Revisited)

Reflection: Jesus' authority is not up for debate. He has shown it in all arenas of life. The question is not whether He reigns, but whether we will submit. The people of Capernaum tried to keep Him for their purposes. But Jesus would not be controlled. He said He must go —to preach, fulfill His mission, and bring the kingdom. That same authority now lays claim on us. We don't define the mission. We don't direct His work. We follow. His Word is not one option among many—it is the rule of our lives, our worship, and our witness. **O.C.W:** We want the benefits of kingdom citizenship without the cost of kingdom allegiance. **Christ Connection:** Jesus bought our kingdom citizenship at the cost of His own blood and now gives His Spirit so allegiance becomes joy.

Colossians 3:16–17 Romans 12:1–2 Matthew 7:24–27

What do these passages reveal about living under Christ's authority, and how does His Word shape that submission?

How do these verses challenge the way we evaluate success, purpose, or faithfulness in the Christian life?

Where do you see your heart resisting Christ's rule, and how do these passages invite renewed trust and obedience?

Prayer:

Lord Jesus, you have spoken with all authority in heaven and on earth. Conquer my pride and align my life with your Word. Shape me into a faithful citizen of your kingdom— Amen.

CATECHISM CORNER

Q. 26. How does Christ execute the office of a king?

A. Christ executes the office of a king, in subduing us to himself, in ruling and defending us, and in restraining and conquering all his and our enemies.

Jesus is not a passive ruler or figurehead. He actively reigns, subduing our rebellious wills, defending us from spiritual enemies, and leading us by his word and Spirit. His kingly authority means we are not our own—we belong to him, body and soul and mind. In a world that prizes autonomy, his reign reorders our loyalties, calling us to joyful submission and bold trust in his rule.

Christ does not rule by force or fear, but by grace that renews the heart. His authority is never harsh or arbitrary; it is holy, just, and kind. Every rival power—whether internal pride or external pressure—only leads to bondage. But when we yield to Christ, we find freedom. His reign brings clarity in confusion, strength in weakness, and peace in the midst of unrest. To belong to this King is to be secure.

Philippians 2:10–11 Isaiah 9:6–7

Where in your life do you resist Christ's kingship, preferring your own control?

How does Christ's rule give you courage in a world of competing authorities?

Prayer: King Jesus, you are enthroned above all powers, and your kingdom shall never end. Subdue my wandering heart and lead me in joyful obedience. Help me to trust your rule when I am tempted to grasp for control. Make me a faithful citizen of your kingdom—living by your word, resting in your defense, and rejoicing in your victory. Amen.

PRAYER/PRAISES

1) Pray that the Lord would raise up deacons from within our congregation.

In this season, many practical needs are being met by your elders, which can stretch the time we have for our primary calling—prayer and the ministry of the Word. We are trusting the Lord to provide co-laborers who can share in the care and service of Christ's body."

2) **Prayer Request from Per:** The past seven weeks have been a painful and hectic time of sudden, unexpected transition and uncertainty in the Office of the Stated Clerk. While the closing of GA has brought an easing of immediate pressure and some resolution, a level of uncertainty will continue through GA next year, at which point we will enter a time of transition with a new Stated Clerk taking office. Please pray for me to find rest from this past period and wisdom and grace in navigating the uncertainty of the coming year.
