God proclaims that we have rebelled against his commandments

Isaiah 58

If you turn back your foot from the Sabbath, from doing your pleasure on my holy day, and call the Sabbath a delight and the holy day of the LORD honorable; if you honor it, not going your own ways, or seeking your own pleasure, or talking idly; then you shall take delight in the LORD, and I will make you ride on the heights of the earth; I will feed you with the heritage of Jacob your father, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken.

Worship must include a recognition of our sin. Without it, our worship lacks integrity. Honesty demands that when we approach God, we confess our sins that offend him.

We confess to God that we have broken his commandments in thoughts, words and deeds

We use this time in God's presence to confess our sins and our need for God's grace, silently, personally, before him alone. We invite you to join us in sorrow over your sin and joy in his grace and mercy in Jesus Christ.

Our reading of Scripture in worship is a voicing of and listening to God's Word, proclaiming who he is, and calling us to respond to him.

GOD SPEAKS WITH US BY HIS GRACE

[1] On a Sabbath, while he was going through the grainfields, his disciples plucked and ate some heads of grain, rubbing them in their hands. [2] But some of the Pharisees said, "Why are you doing what is not lawful to do on the Sabbath?" [3] And Jesus answered them, "Have you not read what David did when he was hungry, he and those who were with him: [4] how he entered the house of God and took and ate the bread of the Presence, which is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and also gave it to those with him?" [5] And he said to them, "The Son of Man is lord of the Sabbath."

[6] On another Sabbath, he entered the synagogue and was teaching, and a man was there whose right hand was withered. [7] And the scribes and the Pharisees watched him, to see whether he would heal on the Sabbath, so that they might find a reason to accuse him. [8] But he knew their thoughts, and he said to the man with the withered hand, "Come and stand here." And he rose and stood there. [9] And Jesus said to them, "I ask you, is it lawful on the Sabbath to do good or to do harm, to save life or to destroy it?" [10] And after looking around at them all he said to him, "Stretch out your hand." And he did so, and his hand was restored. [11] But they were filled with fury and discussed with one another what they might do to Jesus.

We celebrate the Lord's Supper resting in the love of God

We celebrate God's free grace to us in Jesus Christ by observing the Lord's Supper each Sunday. We invite to the Lord's Table all who are baptized followers of Jesus Christ under the authority of Christ and his body, the Church. By eating the bread and drinking the cup, you are acknowledging that you are a sinner, without hope except in the sovereign mercy of God, and that you are trusting in Jesus Christ alone for your salvation. Leader: Which is the fourth commandment?

People: Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do

all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore the

LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy.

Leader: What is required in the fourth commandment?

People: The fourth commandment requires that all people sanctify and keep holy to God such set times as he has appointed in his Word, expressly one whole day in seven, which was the seventh from the beginning of the world to the resurrection of Christ, and the first day of the week ever since, so to

continue to the end of the world. The first day of the week is the Christian

Sabbath; in the New Covenant it is called the *Lord's Day*.

Leader: How is the Sabbath, or Lord's Day, to be sanctified?

People: The Sabbath or Lord's Day is to be sanctified by holy resting all day, not only from such works as are at all times sinful, but also from worldly employments and recreations that are lawful on other days, making it our delight to spend the whole time (except as much of it as is taken up in works of necessity and mercy) in public and private exercises of God's worship. To that end, we are to prepare our hearts, and with foresight, diligence, and moderation, we are to dispose and resolve our worldly business in a timely way, so that we may be more free and fit for the duties

Westminster Larger Catechism Q#117

Catechisms are a question and answer format used for teaching in the church.

In prayer, we come to God bring our burdens to him that we may rest.

Our Daily Worship A through-the-week devotional



The following pages are provided for you with a desire to "lead you beside still waters". May they assist you in your walk with Christ through week, as you practice his presence, feed upon his word, and reflect upon how both impact your weekly life.

SUNDAY

Scripture – Luke 6:1-11

Reflection: The Sabbath was meant to be a garden of beauty and nourishment — a place of refreshing and joy. Yet it had been overrun with the weeds of manmade rules choking out its delight. From the beginning, God planted the Sabbath as his gift (Gen. 2:2–3), blessing the seventh day with rest and holiness. He wove it into his covenant commands (Ex. 20:11), calling his people to delight in him. And when man withered that gift, Jesus, the Lord of the Sabbath, stepped in to restore its life (Mark 2:27–28). In calling himself "Lord of the Sabbath," Jesus was claiming the authority of the Son of Man promised in Daniel 7 — the one given dominion, glory, and a kingdom that shall not pass away. The day belongs to him, and under his reign it becomes what God always intended. The garden belongs to him; therefore, only in him can Sabbath truly flourish. Now the church's weekly rest is a little foretaste of the eternal Sabbath that remains for the people of God (Heb. 4:9–10).

Our Common Weakness: We wither God's good gift of Sabbath by either piling on burdens of our own making or treating it as unimportant.

Christ Connection: Jesus, the Lord of the Sabbath, restores the day to its true purpose. In him we find rest from our labors, joy in God's presence, and a foretaste of the eternal Sabbath that remains for the people of God.

Genesis 2:2–3- What two things did God do to the seventh day?

Exodus 20:11- What reason does God give for the Sabbath command?

Hebrews 4:9–10- What still remains for the people of God, and how is it described?

Consider- What does it mean that the Sabbath belongs to Christ, the Son of Man, and not to us? How does his authority reshape the way we understand the day?

Embrace- How might you rest more deeply in Christ's finished work this week, trusting him as the Lord of the Sabbath?

Prayer Lord of the Sabbath, you planted this day as a garden of beauty and rest. Pull up the weeds of busyness, burdens, and neglect, and plant in me a spirit of joy and delight in you. Teach me to rest in your finished work and to use this day for worship, mercy, and peace. Make my Sabbath a foretaste of the eternal rest that awaits your people. Amen.

MONDAY

Scripture: Luke 6:1-5

Reflection: The disciples were walking through the grain fields with the creator of the universe at their side, enjoying the garden of God's creation. It was much like Adam in the cool of the day — delighting in God's world just as he designed. But then the Pharisees accused the God of the universe — the very one who wrote the law of the Sabbath — of breaking it! It would be like telling the creator of a violin that plucking the strings is not its design because the instruction manual only refers to using a bow. The Pharisees were doing anything but resting. As they trudged through the fields, their hearts carried heavy burdens of anger and resentment. Into this weed-choked garden, Jesus declares himself Lord of the Sabbath, restoring the gift for joy, not for burdens.

Our Common Weakness: Like the Pharisees, we can distort God's design for the Sabbath. They made it heavy with manmade rules. We often make it empty by neglect or indifference. In both ways, the gift of rest is withered when we refuse God's design.

Christ Connection: Jesus, the Son of Man with everlasting authority, restores the Sabbath to its true purpose. As Lord of the Sabbath, he teaches us that the day is not for burdens or for neglect, but for delight in God, rest in his finished work, and holy use in worship and mercy.

Deuteronomy 23:25- What did God's law allow travelers to do in a neighbor's field?

1 Samuel 21:6- How were David and his men provided for when they were hungry? Based on Jesus interpretation of the event, was Ahimelech wrong or right?

Daniel 7:13–14- In Daniel's vision, what authority is given to the Son of Man, and how does this deepen our understanding of Jesus' claim in Luke 6:5?

Consider- If Jesus is the Son of Man with everlasting authority, what does it mean that he — not our rules or traditions — defines the Sabbath?

Embrace- How does recognizing Christ's lordship over the Sabbath free you to receive the day as his gift, rather than as a burden or an afterthought?

Prayer: Lord Jesus, you are the Son of Man, given everlasting dominion and authority. You are Lord of the Sabbath. Forgive me when I twist your good gift — either by adding my own burdens or by neglecting your holy design. Teach me to call the Sabbath a delight, set apart for worship, rest, and mercy. Amen.

TUESDAY

Scripture: Luke 6:6-10

Reflection: Luke carefully places this account right after Jesus' appeal to David in 1 Sam 21. In the grainfields, Jesus exposed the spirit of the law: the Sabbath was given for life, not for death; for mercy, not for burdens. Now, in the synagogue, that truth is lived out before everyone's eyes. A man's hand was withered, and the Pharisees were watching to accuse. Their theology stayed on the page, but not in the heart. Jesus brought the truth to life. He asked, "Is it lawful on the Sabbath to do good or to do harm, to save life or to destroy it?" Then he healed the man's hand, restoring both body and Sabbath at the same time. Here we see mercy not as theory, but as practice.

Our Common Weakness: We often stop at knowing right theology without letting it shape our lives.

Christ Connection: Jesus not only interprets the law rightly — he lives it perfectly. He restores what is withered, and in him we are freed to embody God's mercy as well.

Hosea 6:6- What does God desire more?

Micah 6:6-8— What kind of religious observance(s) does God desire?

Matthew 12:11–12- How does Jesus explain the lawfulness of showing mercy on the Sabbath?

Consider- Where are you tempted to let theology stay in your head instead of shaping your hands?

Embrace- What act of mercy could you put into practice this Lord's Day that would embody what you believe and bring refreshment to another?

Prayer: Lord of mercy, you not only taught the truth but lived it. Heal the withered places in my heart, and make your mercy bloom in my life. On your holy day, help me to worship you with joy and to refresh others with love, so that my rest reflects your heart. Amen.

WEDNESDAY

Scripture: Luke 6:11

Reflection: When Jesus healed the man's hand, mercy bloomed — but the Pharisees responded with rage. Luke says they were "filled with fury" and began plotting against him. Their hearts revealed what their worship had become: anger, control, and self-righteousness. This is false Sabbath-keeping, a garden choked with thorns. True worship, by contrast, grows from Christ's presence. He is the one who gathers his people, heals what is broken, and gives rest. To worship him is to rest from works-righteousness and delight in God's mercy. **Our Common Weakness:** We often treat the Lord's Day as our day — for our preferences. Like the Pharisees, our hearts can be filled with criticism and resentment rather than joy. **Christ Connection:** Jesus restores Sabbath worship by giving himself. He is the true rest, the fulfillment of God's promise (Heb. 4:9–10). In him, our worship is no longer burdened by rage or self-effort, but renewed in gratitude, mercy, and peace. **Matthew 5:21–22-** How does Jesus expose anger in the heart as breaking God's Jaw?

Isaiah 29:13–14- What does God say about those who honor him with lips while their hearts are far away, and how does he judge them by taking away true wisdom and discernment?

Consider- How does Jesus' presence with the disciples on the Sabbath transform worship from empty ritual into joyful rest in God's mercy?

Embrace- What one way could you prepare your heart this week to come to worship with gratitude and delight rather than with criticism or pride?

Prayer: Lord of the Sabbath, you see my heart as clearly as you saw the Pharisees'. Teach me to rest in your finished work, so that my worship is marked by joy, gratitude, and mercy. Make my heart bloom with delight in you. Amen.

THURSDAY

Scripture – Luke 5:37-39

Reflection: Just before these Sabbath accounts, Jesus said: "New wine must be put into fresh wineskins." That is exactly what Luke shows us now. The Pharisees clung to the old wineskin of manmade rules and lifeless religion. But Jesus poured out the new wine of his kingdom — Sabbath as gift, mercy, and worship all restored in him. The old ways could not contain it: their rules turned gifts into burdens and their pride turned mercy into fury. But in Christ, the Sabbath blooms again as something new. The new wine of Christ does not sit still; it bursts forth in life and joy. The day is not about proving righteousness but about resting in his finished work, showing mercy, and worshiping with glad hearts.

Our Common Weakness: We often try to fit Christ's gift into old wineskins; whether by clinging to manmade rules, or neglecting holy rest.

Christ Connection: Jesus is the new wine and the Lord of the Sabbath. He does not abolish the day but restores it to God's intent, filling it with joy, mercy, and worship.

Luke 5:37–38- What happens when new wine is put in old wine skins?

Ezekiel 36:26–27- What work does God promise to do in our hearts so that we can receive what he pours into us?

Revelation 1:10- On what day was John caught up in the Spirit, and what does this reveal about the new life and worship that belong to the risen Christ's people?

Consider- How does the "newness" of Christ's covenant call us to receive the Lord's Day differently from the Pharisees — not as rule-keeping, but as resurrection life?

Embrace- What habit or routine of your Lord's Day could you surrender to Christ this week, asking him to reshape it into something new and life-giving?

Prayer Lord Jesus, you are the new wine and the Lord of the Sabbath. Too often I cling to old wineskins of pride, habit, or self-effort. Pour your Spirit into me and make my heart new, so that your life bursts forth in worship, mercy, and joy. Let my Lord's Day not be stale routine, but a living witness to your resurrection power. Amen.

FRIDAY- CATECHISM CORNER

Q. #60 How is the Sabbath to be sanctified?

A. The catechism shows us the Sabbath as a garden planted with many kinds of fruit to sustain and refresh those who walk through it. It begins with **holy resting** — setting aside ordinary work and recreations so the day is distinct. At its center is **public worship**, the gathered praise of God's people, which is the heartbeat of the day. Alongside it blooms **private worship**, as families and individuals give themselves to prayer, Scripture, and meditation at home. The garden also makes space for **works of necessity** — tasks that sustain life and health — and for **works of mercy**, where love and compassion refresh others. In this way, the Sabbath is not empty ritual or manmade rule, but Christ's gift restored: a day of rest, worship, and mercy under the care of the Lord of the Sabbath.

Leviticus 23:3- What two things does God command for the Sabbath: what are his people to cease from, and what are they to gather for?

Acts 20:7- On what day did the early church gather, and for what purpose?

Matthew 12:12- What does Jesus declare lawful to do on the Sabbath?

Consider- Which of these four "fruits" of the Sabbath (rest, public worship, private devotion, or mercy) is most easily crowded out by weeds in your life?

Why do you think that is?

Spend time asking God to cultivate this part of the Sabbath garden for your refreshing and his glory.

Prayer: Lord of the Sabbath, you are the gardener of my soul. You have planted this day for my refreshment and your glory. I ask that you would cultivate in me the fruits of your Sabbath: deepen my rest in your finished work, fill my heart with joy in public worship, draw me into private devotion with delight, and open my hands to acts of mercy that reflect your love.

Tend the places in me that feel withered or overrun with weeds. By your Spirit, nourish what is weak, strengthen what is small, and cause each part of Sabbath life to flourish. Make this day a garden where I walk with you, rejoice in you, and serve others in your name. Let my life, shaped by your holy day, bear fruit that lasts for eternity and brings glory to your name. Amen.
